Program Notes

It's the Most Liminal Time of the Year!

Did I get your attention with the word "liminal"? It means "transitional" or "threshold." If you're like me, as the beautiful days of September have melted into mid-October, your feelings are kind of liminal too. On the one hand, the crisp days and cool nights are invigorating; on the other, there's an ache to the realization that this year is drawing to a close. Winter isn't far ahead, with its darkness and cold.

But we're going to celebrate this season as it is right now. We'll walk through a forest and watch the falling leaves. We'll enter the world of Jack Pumpkinhead. We'll celebrate love in all its phases—the beginning, full flower, and as it has ended. We'll face storms with courage and surrender to rhythm.

You'll note that our concert has a decidedly Spanish flavor, with around half of our selections sung in that language. Why would that be, you might ask? Because the twin of Halloween is the Day of the Dead—El Día de los Muertos. Both of these holidays have deep and ancient roots going well back to pre-Christian times. We have a number of visiting artists with us tonight, so be sure to look for information elsewhere in this program to read all about them. And I would point out especially, since "mariachis" are mentioned in the title of our concert, that our program includes the wonderful Mariachi Las Dahlias, which will join in with us and also perform a set of their own. They were a real find!

So sit back and drink it all in. We have had a ball working on these pieces, tongue-twisting Spanish lyrics and all. As I close these notes I want to leave you with the final words of the most recently published song on our program, "Autumn," with lyrics by one of America's greatest living poets (although I'm sure he's far too modest to describe himself that way), Charles Anthony Silvestri:

Mike Freeland & Liz Barraud

We were saddened and a little stunned by the passing of two Chorale stalwarts, one current and one previous.

Liz Barraud was a fixture in our 1st Soprano section for years. Long-time chorale patrons will remember her singing the second verse of Silent Night in German while the Chorale hummed, often in the round. I particularly remember her singing it with the only lights in the room on her.

She was that kind of bright light. She had a particular lilt to her voice with a rather quick vibrato. She was also a quick wit with a sometimes ribald sense of humor and a sly smile. We could count on her for advice on our German and French pronunciation. She had moved to the Northwest to be near her daughter, and her failing health finally culminated in the sad news we received in August—not unexpected, but certainly not welcome news.

That same week, our beloved Mike Freeland, our Santa look-alike, passed after a prolonged battle with cancer. He called it the disease with no symptoms, and for many years he battled it with no apparent loss of energy or enthusiasm for the Chorale, for his recording work, and for all the IT details on which we depended upon him for years.

Mike and I had the kind of friendship where you picked up the phone and started mid-thought, mid-sentence, and the understanding was a given. He was a man of keen intellect, catholic tastes, and a tremendous avocational appetite for music of all kinds, especially choral. My single favorite moment with Mike was when we were walking through a mall (a rather strange place for the two of us to be, actually) and two boys, approximately 5 and 7, were walking in front of us, frequently turning to look at Mike with surprise and curiosity. Finally, Mike, the master of understatement, said, "As a matter of fact, I AM!" That sent the pair off at a run, squealing to their mother that they had found Santa Claus. He also delighted in telling children, in ear shot of their parents, "I will be sure that you get that pony you want for Christmas!"

His dedication to the Cherry Creek Chorale was unmatched, and while we will manage to get all the things done that he did for us, we will never replace him.
